Welcome to the end of June 2020. For Long Island beekeepers this means the main nectar flow from trees is almost behind us and our honey bees will be visiting less abundant sources of nectar such as flowers. For new beekeepers once the honey is capped in the honey super vou can harvest some honey and enjoy it with your family and friends. As stewards of our honey bees remember that the bees need around 40-50 lbs. of nectar in the chambers to successfully over winter. Successful bee keepers are also checking for mites. Don't assume the mite count is low and if you do have mites Formic Pro is what is recommended at this time for treatment. Mites and starvation are the most likely cause of colony deaths so always think ahead. Please keep informed of the activities the club has planned for us. Best, John

Spring Survey 2020 NY Bee Wellness Results!

With 2019 a banner honey year and 2019/2020 an average winter, honey bee survival was slightly better than average compared to previous years. Spring 2020 was predicted to be early, but changed to the new yearly trend of cool and rainy conditions well into June, which can result in increased chalkbrood and **European Foulbrood incidence** until the weather improves and brings a good nectar flow; many hives are coming out of Winter strong, so beekeepers need to be extra vigilant concerning varroa mites populations throughout the Summer and Fall.

2514- Total number of bee colonies in December 2019; average of 8 hives per beekeeper

**Guidance to Reduce Bear Conflicts** 

"...In June, black bear movement increases as the breeding season begins and yearling (one-year-old) bears disperse to find their own space. Inevitably some of these bears, particularly yearlings, wander through places these animals would not normally inhabit, like suburban or urban neighborhoods. Bears have an acute sense of smell and may attempt to consume anything they perceive as edible, including improperly stored garbage, birdseed, livestock, pet food, and barbecue grill grease traps. Once a bear has discovered a food source, it may return or seek similar foods at neighboring properties, learning bad behavior that can damage human

property and may lead to the death of the bear. ..."

**READ MORE** 

Hot days ahead can be even hotter with beekeeping apparel on.

- take breaks
- checks hives early or late in the day

Looking for some advice....Almost every time I go into my hives I wind up with ticks on me. Does anyone know of a product that will kill ticks and not harm our bee's? Maybe organic?

I'm not sure myself but Alice Raimondo from Cornell Cooperative Extension is certainly an expert. If you send her an email she will normally get back to you within a day or two.

Roy,

I find it helps a lot to mow around the hives (weed wacker works), and cut back low branches. Spraying your legs and shoes with one of the repellent sprays helps too. You don't put your feet in the hive. Do it a few minutes before, so it is dry. --Grace

Hi Grace.

I do all that you suggested. I have even taken a torch that is used for blacktop and burned the grass picturing all the ticks bursting. I have heard of using a spray that has either rose oil or clove oil, maybe both that will kill the ticks.

#### Roy

I have used both Picaridin and 3M Ultrathon (a form of DEET) on my clothes as a tick and mosquito repellent and have found both work well when working outdoors. However, when working with the bees I don't spray my bee jacket or veil, just the lower legs of my pants.

#### Hi Tick Food,

Let my also indorse the Sawyer product. I got it in an aerosol at The Home Depot. The active ingredient, Permethrin, will kill any ticks that walk on it. Spray it on your pants and let it dry, wear the same pants each time you visit the bee yard as it has a long residual. Also, tuck your pants into your socks. It says effective for six weeks and six washings. Do not spray on your skin, this is not like Off®. Rich B

Thanks everyone for contributing to my question on ticks. I remember a few years ago hearing of a tick spray that contained rose or clove oil, maybe both. This could be sprayed around your yard to kill ticks but according to Alice from Cornell this doesn't exist. So, I'll keep spraying my pants and boots. Roy
